Dear St Finbar's Community,

You may have noticed over the last couple of weeks that we have had a number of Staff attending Professional Development. I know myself that I was at a meeting every day for two weeks. I just want to apologise for not informing parents of when teachers were to be absent. I am going to try and inform parents in future of when staff will not be in class. I do want to reassure you that while your child's teacher is not in class, we do try to maintain routines. The class teacher will leave work for the casual teacher to complete and there are clear lines of communication between the casual teacher and the class teacher so that learning outcomes for all students are met.

As a school we have also just completed case management meetings. This means that the Leadership Team, Support Staff and Classroom Teachers have met and collected data on every child in the school and recorded this on a whole school data base. The information that we have collected includes their MAI's (maths assessments), reading levels and skills, notes taken at our meet and greet as well as information collected over the previous year on your child. We are now at the stage where we are designing more specific intervention. This may take the form of an enrichment program that Mrs Southern - Gale will be facilitating in co-operation with Mrs Wasson. We are exploring the idea of this being a Science focus. We have registered for external competitions in Mathematics and English. The Learning Centre has been up and running effectively, meeting the Literacy needs of all students. We are about to commence some individual programs in reading for some students who are operating beyond the Stage expectations. We will be using the Maker Model and Tony Ryan's Thinking Keys (these are models that are designed to develop critical thinking skills in gifted students).

We are making every effort to ensure that the learning needs of all students are being met. This is a big challenge and very time consuming but as a team of professionals we see this as a vital part of our work as Catholic educators. At times we make mistakes. If you feel that we have overlooked something regarding your child, I hope you feel welcome to contact in the first instance your child's classroom teacher. I also like to be informed about each and every child at my school. I see myself as a learner and I am always open to conversations and to listen to your concerns. Together we can and do make a difference.

FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Boys are influenced by their home environments

When literacy is seen as a social practice it is possible to acknowledge that boys arrive at school with a broad knowledge of the social uses of literacy within their own homes and communities eg. storytelling, letter writing, use of calendars, shopping lists etc. Parents and the home play an important role in the development of literacy skills.

There are many forms of literacy, each with specific purposes and contexts in which they are used. This includes many non-traditional and multiliteracies, such as map and diagram reading, and use of manuals for construction and repair work.

It is therefore important to acknowledge the vital role that both mothers and fathers play in modelling literacy-based activities.

WHAT TEACHERS WANT PARENTS TO KNOW ABOUT READING!

One of the biggest issues that is often brought to the teacher by a parent of a 5-8 year old child is the concern about what reading level their child is at. Many parents worry that their child is significantly below another child in their class or not moving up levels as fast as they should. The first thing that teachers want to shout from the rooftops is:

"Parents, stop obsessing over reading levels!"

A reading level (whether it be a number, colour or letter, depending on the book) indicates to the teacher what type of reader the child is. A child could be a beginner reader, emergent (developing) reader or an independent reader. As a parent, it is important not to show your child your interest in the number, colour or letter but focus on the reading skills that your child is developing.

The book that comes home should be easy for your child. Reading at home should be an opportunity for your child to practise a smooth clear reading voice. Reading for them at home needs to be enjoyable and not a time for struggling and arguing. Parents are encouraged to ask lots of questions while their child is reading to check that they understand the story line or facts of the text.

Parents voice concerns about their child staying on a level for a long time. Teachers need a child to be secure (very competent) at a level before moving on. Being secure means that their reading voice is smooth and fluent, they can read a variety of texts at that level, have a variety of reading strategies they use to work out unknown words

independently and they have great comprehension of the text. Children need to be exposed to both fiction and non-fiction books at each level. Non-fiction books tend to be harder for children as the vocabulary is more demanding. Lots of exposure to non-fiction texts will help your child increase their vocabulary. If you have any concerns or questions please do not hesitate to contact me as I am more than happy to answer any of your questions.
