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#### STAGE THREE GOLD FIELD EXCURSION

Star and Sofia

On the 4th of June 2015, Stage Three went on their excursion to Bathurst Goldfields. It was a day full of fun and learning. We had to get up very early because the bus left at 7:30. There were lots of hands on activities, not to mention the two hour bus trip (where a couple kids threw up).

The first thing we did when we got there was eat our recess so we had enough fuel until lunch. We started our gold learning experience by going into a pretend olden day mine shaft, where the lighting was very dim without our new and fancy electric lights. The only source of light in those days were candles made from lard, which is animal fat. Then off we tramped to the museum. There our tour guide Trevor, showed us many amazing things including a replica of the mine shaft, a photo of the largest gold nugget in Australia, gold leaf, real gold coins (sovereign coins) and mining tools.

Now, moving to the outside world we see a few more things before heading towards a replica Blacksmith's shop. At the Blacksmith's, we forged a poker for our school which is now on display in the office. (Here is a photo of Star and Eddie hard at work, pumping the bellows.)

After the excitement of the Blacksmith's Workshop, we moved on to look at the life of the Chinese diggers during gold rush



times. We learnt that the Chinese worked all together, where as the Englishmen worked in small groups or individually. The Englishmen loathed the Chinese because of their luck, wealth and because they found twice as much gold as the English did and the English thought it belonged to them.

The next thing we did was panning. This was lots of fun and several people found gold flakes. Luckily no one got too wet! However, a few people dropped their pan in the water (which was freezing!) and had to find it by sticking their arms in all the way to their elbows. Although a few struck rich by finding a one or more flakes of gold and others imagined they were lucky, in total the panning experience was a load of fun!

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Next we had our lunch (because we were starving) and we went off to learn about and experience the early settlers' life. We learnt about the sort of house they lived in, which wasn't big, only one or two rooms if they were lucky. The father would go gold mining every day except Sunday as this was the Sabbath rest day. The mother would stay home to cook, clean and do other chores like caring for the animals. Some women would try to earn some extra money for the family by taking in the laundry of other people. The kids were expected to help out too. On Sunday, the mother didn't have much of a rest, although after how hard her week was, she thought she was having it easy. It was off to Church, then home to start cooking over the fire and getting ready for another busy week. I wouldn't like to be a woman in those days!

We made mud bricks, with mud and straw. We shaped it with a frame and wooden planks, then left it to dry in the sun. It would have taken an awfully long time to make a house this way. We also played some early settlement games such as: tug of war, dirt bowls and horse shoe quoits.



(Here are some stage 3 kids playing tug of war). We made damper, which is also known as "bush bread," a dough that only consists of flour and water. We cooked it on sticks over the campfire and ate it with Cocky's Joy (golden syrup). We finished off our day with afternoon tea and the gift shop. Stage Three had an absolutely, wonderful day full of learning and adventures!
