# **Closing of Holy Doors in Year of Mercy**

Our Diocesan Way of Mercy pilgrimage concluded on Sunday 13 November with a ceremony at St Patrick's Cathedral in Parramatta. The ceremony commenced with the arrival of the Cross and Relics and Way of Mercy procession at 4.30pm. Mrs Stenning and Miss Lynch represented our school at this special ceremony.

At the 6pm Mass, Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv closed the Cathedral's Holy Door.

The Holy Doors in our Diocese were also closed at the Schoenstatt Shrine, Mulgoa, the Shrine of the Holy Innocents, Kellyville, and Our Lady of Czestochowa Chapel, Marayong. The Year of Mercy will end on the Solemnity of Christ the King on 20 November when Pope Francis will close the Holy Door in St Peter's Basilica.



### Listening skills worth having

I recently read an article by Stephen R. Covey. He points out that "Most people do not listen with the intent to understand; they listen with the intent to reply."

(Source: Stephen R. Covey, *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People: Powerful Lessons in Personal Change*). This professional reading made me stop and think about listening to others and how important this is to learn from a young age.

Having awesome listening skills will <u>make people trust and like you more</u>. Good listeners ask questions, and respect people's right to disagree, but they also <u>know when to get help</u> with a problem. Everyone can <u>learn to be a good listener</u>.

# Why listen?

Listening isn't just the part of communication where you take breaths. There's a massive upside to having sound listening skills. You can help your friends, and people will be more likely to trust what you say.

## How to be an expert listener:

#### Let them talk

If someone's telling you something difficult or important for them, don't cut over them with a story about yourself, even if it's relevant. Let them finish and try to work out what it means to them.

# Don't judge

If someone comes to you with a problem, try to be a friend without saying things that might damage them. Work through whatever they're dealing with and suggest options rather than passing judgement.

# Let someone disagree

If someone comes to you for help and you listen to them, tell them what you'd do or give them advice, that's great. But that advice may not work, or they might not agree with what you say. And that's okay, let them do that.

# **Ask good questions**

What are good questions? Open questions that let the speaker go anywhere. Instead of asking "yes/no"-style questions, think about "how does that work" or "tell me about...".

### Show them you're listening

People will trust you more if they can see you're listening to them. Ask questions about what they're saying, and put it back to them in different words to see if you've gotten it right.

### **Body language**

Having open, relaxed body language – facing a person, not too close, and making occasional eye contact – will make whoever's talking to you more comfortable.

### Know when to get help

If someone's got problems you can't solve (or maybe even don't want to hear about), try to put them onto someone who can help them deal with it. If you want, you could offer to go with them for support.

# **Students Not Returning for 2017**

The school is currently interviewing families for enrolment for 2017. Places are limited in some grades. To enable the school to plan appropriately we would appreciate families of students in Grades K-5 who are not returning in 2017 to please notify the school in writing as soon as possible. Your timely attention to this matter would be much appreciated as the implications regarding staffing and resourcing by the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta Office stem from accurate enrolment numbers.



# **School Opal Card**

The School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) provides eligible school students with free or subsidised travel on public transport between home and school, on trains, buses, ferries and long distance coach services.

Many students will automatically receive a School Opal card for the 2017 school year. However you will need to complete a form online at www.transportnsw.info/school-students if:

- Applying for an SSTS Opal Card for the first time
- Enrolling in Kindergarten
- Progressing from Year 2 to Year 3
- Progressing from Year 6 to Year 7
- Changing name, school and/or address
- Requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation.

Applications must be made by a parent or legal guardian of the student. Applications are subject to eligibility criteria.

Reminder: Students must tap-on and tap-off for each journey to and from school, therefore they must have a current School Opal Card with them every time they travel.

# A Reminder for our school community, complaints and grievances

If, at any time, you find that you have a concern with the school, you are encouraged to come to the school and speak with the Teacher/s, Assistant Principal and/or Principal, to identify your concern. It is our aim to work with all members of our school community to ensure that we do the very best to provide a productive, safe and enjoyable learning experience for our students and professionally fulfilling experience of our staff. If you would like to raise a concern, the Catholic Education Office has guidelines for ensuring that complaints are handled fairly. 



# PBS4L and BOUNCE BACK Update

All students have been focusing on "being safe" and being in the right place at the right time and doing the right thing.



We have discussed our three agreements when in our play spaces, learning spaces, as well as being safe when walking to the school office, canteen, library, toilet, art room and music room. Our school agreements can be shown in all areas of life. The use of a consistent language at home and school is a fantastic strategy to reinforce positive behaviour. Some talking points, which use the language of our school agreements, are outlined below. These talking points provide a link between the agreements within the school and home settings.

#### Safe

- How can we be safe when leaving the school each afternoon?
- How can we be safe when moving around the school?
- Am I in the right place at the right time and doing the right thing?

#### **BOUNCE BACK!**

What can you do to help your child develop and live by good values?

Give your child positive feedback when they act honestly (e.g. when they tell the truth, own up to what they have done, avoid the temptation to keep something that belongs to someone else, and when they try to identify who owns something they have found that doesn't belong to them).

Play age-appropriate board and card games with your children. This provides an opportunity for you to reinforce playing fairly by following the rules of a game and not cheating. Playing games with your children also provides an opportunity for them to practise social skills such as being a good winner and loser.

Help them to develop kindness and a sense of fairness towards others who are less fortunate than themselves. Model for them some ways to support others who are in need.

Encourage your child to appreciate and return the kindnesses and favours they receive from others.

Present different people's points of view when talking problems through with your child. This helps them gain a sense of what's fair for everyone involved.

Give your child regular chores and give them positive feedback when they do these without being reminded. Stress that people will trust and respect you more when you behave responsibly.

Model cooperative behaviours for your child by working with them on a project (e.g. building a model) or task (e.g. tidying up the garage). Comment on how and why things went well (e.g. you both did a good share of the work, each did the part they were good at and each respected what the other person did).

Provide opportunities for your child to socialise with their extended family, neighbours and friends, and participate in community groups such as clubs and sporting teams. Emphasise the importance of being friendly and accepting differences in people and discuss with your child how they might do this in each situation. Show them by example too.

Never give up! Sometimes there is a 'sleeper effect' and values that your child didn't seem to 'take up' at an earlier age pop up in their behaviour when they are older.

The Bounce Back program will be taught alongside our PBS4L program teaching the children how to be act and be resilient in various situations throughout the day.
