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BISHOP VINCENT VISIT TO ST FINBAR'S GLENBROOK PARISH

Homily for the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity at St Finbar's Parish, Glenbrook

27 May 2018



Dear brothers and sisters,

It has been a particularly trying week for the Catholic Church in Australia. Once again, it has found itself under the spotlight – for all the wrong reasons. The highest-ranking Catholic official in the world found guilty of child sex abuse cover up, ran the headlines. The reaction has been swift and damning: that the church is steeped in a culture of self-interest and self-preservation; that children and the vulnerable are not safe in it; that the custodians of this culture are not to be trusted. As I walked the aisles at the local supermarket with my Roman collar and cross, I wondered what people thought of me. I wondered if I was tarred with the same brush. It was hard to put on a brave face. Many of you might have felt deflated and even disillusioned as you processed the negative publicity. You

The church has been humbled and humiliated. It has been thrown off its high horse because it has been exposed as having failed its mission and betrayed its own ethos. But it is not necessarily a bad thing that we now have to start from a position of weakness and vulnerability in order to regain our trust and indeed our Gospel compass. We are reminded of the story of the Apostle Paul on his way to Damascus. Things did not turn out the way he had expected. He experienced a profound turn of events. He had an unwelcome reality check and a temporary blindness. But this complete vulnerability was the catalyst for a whole new way of seeing, acting and being. Paul was never the same afterwards. His strength no longer came from his status, entitlement, privilege and power. It came from the utter powerlessness of the Servant Christ.



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The Catholic Church has had its Damascus moment in the sexual abuse crisis. It has fallen from the privileged position in society and the power and influence that came with that status. Now, like Paul, it is undergoing a time of uncertainty and darkness. We should not fear this time. For it is the Kairos to repent of our institutional failures and to restore confidence in the church. It is the favourable moment to undertake deep reform that will align its culture and structure to the vision of the Nazarene. It is the opportunity to replace clerical impunity, elitism and self-interest with accountability, humility and equal discipleship.

Today, we celebrate the core of our Christian faith: the God of love who reveals himself not as one who is siloed, removed and aloof from humanity. Rather, God reveals himself as relational and closely bonded with humanity. This is the message of Moses in the first reading: God is closely bonded with his people throughout the ebbs and flows of history. He delivered them from oppression and slavery in Egypt. Therefore, they are to form a post-Exodus society, which would reflect the God of communion and love. This new society would be marked by concern for the God-given dignity of all and special attention to the most vulnerable, in biblical terms, the widows, the orphans and the strangers. For Moses and the Israelites, worship of God is expressed in love of neighbour and human flourishing

The Gospel tells us the story of Jesus sending his disciples to preach the Good News after his ascension. "Go, therefore, make disciples of all the nations; baptise them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teach them to observe all the commands I gave you". This missionary mandate has to be understood in the broader context of Jesus' own ministry. For clearly, the God that we meet in Jesus is not a tribal God who excludes other people on the basis of their background, gender, race or even religion. Rather, the God revealed in Jesus transcends all human barriers. It is the God who is radically inclusive; who identifies himself with the least, the last and the lost; who is frequently at the margins rather than centres of power.

Thus, we cannot make disciples of all the nations when we fail to live out the radical inclusivity and solidarity that Jesus embodied. When privilege, power and dominance are more evident than love, humility and servanthood in the church, then our preaching rings hollow. When the full citizenship of the baptised is undermined by the elitism of the ordained, then we betray the lesson of foot-washing leadership.

Dear friends,

It is a sobering reality that we are confronted with. The church that we love is at a critical juncture. What is being asked of us is nothing less than a wholehearted commitment to follow the long hard road to conversion. May we have the courage to die to old ways of being church that no longer convey the message of the Gospel to the culture in which we live. May the leaders in particular, like Paul, embrace the downward mobility, inclusivity and solidarity of the Servant Lord. Let us go forward in our mission to make a difference in the world, confident of the victory of Christ and his promise to be with us till the end of time. May our lives and relationships reflect the God of communion and love.

Many paths to reading - Parramatta Advertiser, 06/06/2018





WE know that high levels of literacy mean more opportunities for young people.

We also know that teachers play a critical important role in teaching children how to read. The work of most teachers is evident in the early years when students begin developing their vocabulary and awareness of letter sounds. The saying that 'There's more than one way to skin a cat' can also apply to teaching children to read. Decades of research show the benefits of using several strategies.

There have been a number of stories in the media in the past months about the Reading Recovery early intervention reading program. I am a strong supporter of it



and we continue to use the program to great success in schools in the Diocese of Parramatta. I also acknowledge that other strategies, including phonics, have an important role to play.

The work of schools in teaching children to read is vitally important but we are misguided if we think that this responsibility sits only with schools. We know that the earlier we expose children to spoken language, reading, singing, rhymes and books, the earlier we lay foundations of literacy.

Most parents, whether they are aware of it or not, use different strategies when they are reading or singing to a child.

They sound out the letters in a word, they may make connections between the word and the pictures, they ask questions about the book cover in an attempt to provide clues about the story.

If as a society we are serious about addressing declining literacy levels among young people, then we need to look beyond what we teach in Kindy or Year 1. We need to be looking at ways we can support children from the time they are born.

This may mean providing additional support and education to parents with lower literacy levels, encouraging more parents to visit libraries and, where it's possible, using technology to connect skilled readers with young children. We need to be looking at approaches that are not aimed at fixing the problem but preventing it from happening in the first place.



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2018 Semester One Reports

At the end of Week 8 you will have received your child's Half-Yearly School Report. The report format meets the Federal Government and Parramatta Diocesan requirements. All children in Years 1-6 are graded using a five grade scale - A,B,C,D,E, the scale summarising the standard (or quality) of achievement. This scale was developed to give parents insight into how well their child has achieved at the subjects studied by describing the depth of knowledge and understanding as well as the range of skills. Teachers decide which grade best matches the standard your child has achieved based on many pieces of work, assessments, and observations.

Children in Kindergarten are not graded using an A-E scale, but rather by their own level of development over the first year at school. The grades that we use are:

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Another concept that is important to consider when you look at your child's report is "Staging". Staging refers to structure that the New South Wales Curriculum is set by, this is established by the NSW Education

Standards Authority (NESA). The Curriculum is set in response to research that states that it typically takes a child 18 months to 2 years to master a learning outcome. Outcomes are introduced at the beginning of each "Stage" and consolidated for most children by the end of each "Stage".

Hence, children in Years 1, 3 and 5 (commencing Stage 1, Stage 2 and Stage 3) typically would perform at a lower grade than children in Years 2, 4 and 6 (at the end of Stage 1, Stage 2 and Stage 3). This is because those at the end of the Stage of Learning have had 2 years to consolidate their understanding of the various learning outcomes. Our program of learning is therefore implemented over two years, which ensures no repetition of content while allowing ongoing practice of skills.

So what might this mean for your child?

This may mean for a child in Year 2 or 4 in 2016 that their 2017 grade seems to indicate that they are not performing at the same level as they did the previous year.

For example a child's standard of work in English at the end of Stage 2 (Year 4) in 2016 may have been assessed as a "B", yet at the end of Semester 1, (beginning of Stage 3 –Year 5), their standard of work in English may be assessed as a "D."

Be assured your child's work is not necessarily of a lesser standard. It is more likely to be that they are yet to master a particular outcome of learning that is new to them. As always, the level of your child's effort must also be considered when discussing the grade given to their standard of work.

At *St Finbar's* we have developed high expectations for our students' learning. While looking at your child's report, remember to refer to the statements of achievement that describe your child's level of success in each Key Learning Area. Also remember to pay attention to your child's work habits. You might like to keep the following four tips in mind when reading your child's report:

1. Look for strengths first. Focus on the strengths and celebrate these areas.

2. Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning. If the report indicates that effort needs attention, then they have something to work on. If your child is putting in the required effort, speak to your child about how pleasing this is and how it has a positive impact on their learning.

3. Broaden your focus to form a picture of your child's progress as a member of a social setting. How your child gets along with his or her peers will influence their happiness and well-being.

4. Discuss the report with your son or daughter talking about strengths first before looking at areas that need improvement. Ask for their opinion about how they performed and discuss their concerns.

Should you have any questions or concerns about your child's report, please discuss this with your child's class teachers.

Your child's half yearly report will not have any comments. The reason for this is that we believe that a face to face meeting allows for clear lines of communication and provides an opportunity for a broader perspective of your child's achievements. We will be posting an online booking schedule in the coming weeks for you to book in for this important conference. We encourage you to bring your child along to this meeting because we value the role that student voice plays in learning
