Last Friday we attended a beautiful mass to celebrate All Saints Day. November is traditionally the month of the year that we remember and pray for all those who have departed Earth to find their eternal home in the Kingdom of God. November 1 was also a special date for my family.... It was my Uncle Ron's 80th birthday.

My dad passed away 16 years ago, and Ron was his younger brother. They were very close as brothers and often got into lots of mischief, mainly at the expense of my poor Nanna! I remember her telling us once about how they used to race their bantam chicks down her freshly waxed floors in the hallway. And another time they used a little electric generator to charge the copper

door handles, so when Nan tried to come in the back door she would touch the handle and get a mild electric shock! No matter how cheeky, they were much loved by my Nanna.

As the boys grew into men, they both ended up working in the food industry and my Uncle Ron progressed from being in catering in the army to owning his own restaurant, to eventually working at the markets in food quality control, while my father worked in research and development for a food company. Both men were dedicated to living their faith through service to the church and community in many ways, such as visiting the sick, being an acolyte, and to this day, my Uncle Ron picks up disabled children to drive them to their school and back home every afternoon. My point is, that these young boys were not saints as children. They were ordinary little boys who got into mischief from time to time. However, they grew up knowing that service to others was an important part of their lives. These are what I would call "everyday saints" and people like my dad and Uncle Ron walk among us constantly.

Earlier in the year I attended a Principal's retreat and we discussed our schools as being Holy Ground, with Saints walking among us. So while it's important to remember the saints and ask them to intercede on our behalf, it is so important to recognise the everyday saints that cross our path each day.



At a recent Principal's meeting we prayed The Beatitudes for Modern Life. These Beatitudes acknowledge the lives of everyday saints among us and I include them here:

Blessed are those who "recognize their need for God," who acknowledge their dependence on God and His gifts to them.

Blessed are those who though they are blessed with fine families and friends are still very concerned with the pain and suffering of others, either nearby or at a distance. These others are their human brothers and sisters.

Blessed are the generous people who give of their love, their time, their money, and somehow keep on giving despite disillusionment and disappointment in seeing their efforts go wasted.

Blessed are the "big people" who can forgive those who are petty, angry, rude, or neurotic, and seek to find and delight in the good qualities of the people around them.

Blessed are those who respect a person as an individual and do not prejudge him or her because of race, colour, ethnic, or economic background or sexual identity. They do not, therefore, reduce that individual's many good qualities to one rather unessential characteristic.

Blessed are the single persons who somehow can hack this life alone.

Blessed is the partner in marriage whose love affirms his or her partner with patience, understanding, and especially, forgiveness, helping that partner to keep growing in every way.

Blessed are the parents who love and respect their children as individuals. They realize that, regardless of what their children are taught and how they are disciplined, they will learn especially by imitation of them.

Blessed are the parents of teenagers who can really listen and give them time in casual, low-keyed situations, and who take time to explain and discuss quietly their reasons for certain actions.

Blessed are the children and teenagers who respect their parents, who try not to inflict their growing pains upon the ones who love them the most, and who contribute to the family with their time and communication.

Blessed are the peacemakers who before a rift in a family is frozen like ice and divides a family for years, go out of their way to settle disputes, heal the bruised egos, and restore peace.

Blessed are those who mourn the loss of a loved one and who, because of their hope in Christ, work through this pain and anger without becoming depressed or bitter.

Blessed are those who do not resent the poor or the homeless.

Blessed are those who befriend the handicapped and appreciate the people in their lives who teach them that no situation is hopeless and that they should use all the talents they have.

Blessed are those men and women who in the September of their lives still wonder how they can serve God and others better. In their cheerful acceptance of pain and inconvenience, they give witness to a strong belief in a loving God.

Blessed are those who like Christ are facing what seems like a senseless death with so many jobs to be done and people to take care of. This trust in the face of death is their last compliment to a loving and caring Father who waits to reward them.

Blessed are those people who are most sensitive to pain and injustice around them. They help us to keep our vision clear. By this example, they help us to be patient, loving, and forgiving. They inspire us to keep putting one foot in front of the other in our attempts to walk the path of Christ in following the ideals of these beatitudes.

Blessed are those selfless people who throw parties that get families and friends together.

This Friday, we welcome our 2020 Kindergarten cohort and their families to our school community. We hope that they enjoy their first taste of school and their families feel welcomed and accepted into our community. Thank you to the 2019 Kindergarten parents who gave generously of their time and cooking skills to welcome and share hospitality with our new and existing families.

Last weekend, the Gospel reading was one that we would all remember, The Story of Zacchaeus.

However, last weekend my parish priest put a new lens on the story for me. He talked about the importance of the actions of Zacchaeus. How we have this grown man. A wealthy, successful, opulent, well-dressed and in

many ways elitist man, who decided to climb a tree in front of a crowd of people who he demanded respect from. Why would he put himself in such a position? To the crowd below they thought it was all a bit strange.

But Zacchaeus' actions tell us that if we want to see Jesus, we may have to get out of our comfort zone. The metaphor of Zacchaeus climbing the tree relates to the choices we make each day to look for the good around us. Jesus is present in each and every one of us, and like Zacchaeus we are certainly not all perfect, but there is always an opportunity to find Jesus in our daily actions.

I am sure there are days that we are faced with our own "tree" to climb. It is what you do when you get to the top that is important. In that moment can you find Jesus?



At St Finbar's we offer group strings tuition to Years 3 to 6 with our own highly professional specialist teachers.

Lessons are available in groups of 4 to 6. Cost per student per term for a 30 minute lesson each week (minimum of 8 lessons per term) is \$110.00. Tuition Fees will be charged to your School Fee Account.

Extended Leave Applications for Students

As you know it is very important that children attend school every day. Quite often leave is requested by parents for various reasons. While we understand that this may be necessary sometimes, it is not encouraged as every school day is important for every child.

If you intend taking your child out of school for **five days or more** you must make a formal application in writing to the Principal and fill out an application for extended leave which is available from the school office. Each application will be considered on an individual basis and could depend on circumstances such as the intention for the leave, your child's attendance, and the impact the leave may have on your child's academic progress.

These regulations are in place to make sure that your child achieves to his/her full potential and we know you will understand the reasoning behind them.

COSHC 2020 Enrolment Form

The 2020 Enrolment form for COSHC is now available here. If you require before and after school care for your child, please complete the enrolment form and return it to COSHC as soon as possible.

Forms can be returned via email to coshcstfinbars@parra.catholic.edu.au or alternatively they can be dropped into the school office.

The enrolment form needs to be completed and provided with a copy of your child's birth certificate, medical immunisation statement and both parent ID's. If your child has a medical condition, please provide a letter of diagnosis from the relevant Doctor and also a current Action Plan.

Keep in mind that places are limited, so it is a good idea to return your forms early.

Adoration & Benediction: Usually after Friday morning Mass.


