Dear Parents and Carers,

My dad had a unique way of getting us kids excited about going to mass on a Sunday. Once a month he would announce that it was "Mystery Mass" day. This meant that we had no idea where we were going to attend mass, but we knew that it would involve a journey, lots of clues and guesses from us kids, and brunch afterwards in (to us, anyway) some exciting and possibly exotic place! One of my favourite "Mystery Masses" was when we would go into the city and worship at St. Mary's Cathedral. So, last weekend I was in Bathurst for a family weekend away, and we were

reminded of our "Mystery Mass" tours. When we went to mass on Sunday,we didn't know anyone, the priest was a stranger and we were definitely going to brunch afterwards! It was so lovely to meet new people and to share a little of ourselves with them, and them with us. Father gave a terrific sermon, which got me thinking about the recent theme over the past few weeks, namely how to enter the Kingdom of Heaven. This week we learned about the "narrow gate" and as Father told us, *NO PAIN, NO GAIN!* His explanation for this statement was quite enlightening. Basically, without putting in the hard yards in terms of our own spirituality, then entering the Kingdom of God, entering the narrow gate, may prove a bit tricky! It's not enough to rely upon ourselves, to make sure we attend mass, but we need Jesus to show us the way through the narrow gate into the Kingdom of Heaven. If we are too focused on ourselves, we will never be fit enough to squeeze through that narrow gate. We need to be inspired by Jesus, who worked with the marginalised, and realise that everyone deserves a place at the Lord's banquet table... not just those that help themselves! So take some time to help someone else this week... a kind smile, a friendly gesture, a shared cuppa....

These are the little building blocks that help us to become spiritually fit and able to pass through that gate.





In Hattie's Visible Learning Meta Data Analysis, he studied what aspects of a school have the greatest impact on student learning.

If you were asked to review this list of nine factors on student learning, how would you rank them? Which ones would you say have the highest or lowest impact on learning?

Expectations; Mastery Learning; Homework; Challenge of Goals; Feedback; Aims & Policies of the School; Ability Grouping; Student Collaboration; Teacher-Student Relationships.



So before you think of your answer, does this statement from Hattie change or help you with your order? All children can learn when they focus on mastering tasks in a collaborative environment, which includes high levels of cooperation between classmates, with focused teacher feedback that is both frequent and diagnostic.

This is the order, with the ones in black indicating that they do not have a positive effect on student growth:

- 1. Feedback
- 2. Teacher-Student Relationships
- 3. Mastery Learning
- 4. Challenge of Goals
- 5. Student Collaboration
- 6. Expectations
- 7. Homework
- 8. Aims & Policies of the School
- 9. Ability Grouping

So, with feedback being number one, having nearly double the positive effect on student learning than the average, how do we ensure feedback is given?

As a guide, we will ensure:

- Quality feedback is given, not more feedback;
- Feedback is acted on, by targeting lessons to support gaps and scaffolding lessons for students to support mastery of learning;
- Students have a Growth Mindset. Students with a Growth Mindset welcome feedback and are more likely to use it to improve their performance;
- Oral feedback is much more effective than written;
- That students provide feedback to teachers. For example, through our Show Us What You Knows, teachers capture students' understanding, knowledge and skills before a learning sequence is commenced. Hattie tells us that the most powerful feedback is provided from the student to the teacher.

It is interesting to see ability grouping down the bottom. The research tells us that student learning is far greater when students work in mixed ability groups. Class ability grouping and within class ability grouping have a uniformly low impact on learning. It means we learn better from each other, when we all have different strengths and weaknesses: socially, emotionally, physically and academically.

A reminder to our Junior Altar Servers to check your roster to see if you are serving at the next Parish Mass. A roster is also on display in the COSHC window.






